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

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# What is this Big Kansas Road Trip?



Have you viewed the colorful friezes, bands and patterns inside St. Mary's Church in St. Benedict? Have you walked around the astonishing Davis Memorial in Hiawatha? Have you viewed four states from the White Cloud lookout?

You can hear about these things or see them in a brochure, but it can't compare to seeing the award-winning interior in person, seeing the stone faces of Sarah and John Davis up close or taking the winding road to the top of White Cloud to look beyond the Missouri River.

The Big Kansas Road Trip (BKRT) is about being there. It's about sinking your teeth into a strawberry-rhubarb pie at The Bread Bowl in Hiawatha, looking up to the Civil War Statue in the Wathena cemetery, and adding a shoe to the shoe tree near Wetmore. The BKRT is about the full effect, all five senses in action. The difference is immense in reading about a place and having first-hand experiences.

Kansas Sampler Foundation director Marci Penner said, "We've asked these three counties to just be themselves. If they want to add some scheduled activities, that is up to them, but all we really want is to create an open-house atmosphere where visitors feel welcomed and locals can show what they have and who they are in a low-key manner."

Geoffrey Allison, co-producer of *Uncovering Kansas*, explains his experience at the 2018 event this way. "In the background of the BKRT is a vibe. There's a rhythm of hospitality offering a consistent experience not typically available to travelers. Because these small towns were expecting visitors, they were ready and willing to engage."

Though the Inman-based Kansas Sampler Foundation facilitates the organizing of the BKRT, it's local leadership that does the work in the counties. Led by Linda Duesing and Connie Werner in Brown County, Leah Johnson in Doniphan County, and Cindy Alderfer, Kylee Luckeroth, and Gina Murchison in Nemaha County, there are many people involved in getting ready to roll out the red carpet.

Penner said to the exploring public, "You get to pick and choose your own adventure concentrating on what you like best. You choose your own schedule and travel at your own pace. Your curiosity should direct you. Talk to the locals. And, just have fun!"

Three counties. Four days. Hundreds of people. All seeing rural northeast Kansas with new eyes.







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
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# How will the Big Kansas Road Trip work?

BKRT yard signs will be in front of participating entities and will indicate where to turn when out in the country.



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


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Some will be surprised to learn that Brown County is home to the Kickapoo Indian Reservation, most of the Sac and Fox Reservation and the majority of the Iowa Reservation of Kansas and Nebraska. The county seat, Hiawatha, is known as the City of Beautiful Maples because in 1918 T.H. Korthanke shared seedlings of a stately Maple he had on his property with anyone who would tend to them. The first rural electric power pole in Kansas was erected in Horton in 1937. It's a county of small towns and historic barns that will hold your interest.

Want to see one of the largest personal cemetery memorials in the nation or see the location of the first rural electric power pole in Kansas?

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# DONIPHAN COUNTY

Founded in 1855, Doniphan was the first named county in the state. Bearing the surname of Alexander Doniphan, a colonel in the Mexican War, the county thrived in the early days due to prevalent steamboat travel on the Missouri River. Immigrants from Switzerland, France, and Germany settled the area, and due to the landscape of hills and valleys it earned the nickname Little Switzerland. The northern end of the Glacial Hills Scenic Byway, historic barns and signs for many trails including the California Trail, Pony Express, and the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

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

Section Art post office murals, WPA structures, outstanding veteran memorials, historic ghost towns, Pony Express history, and some of the most beautiful churches in the state are located here. Albany, a former Underground Railroad stop where John Brown once stayed, is an old townsite now kept alive by dedicated volunteers. One town, Sabetha, is home to Wenger Manufacturing (extrusion products) which has more employees than the city has population. In the late 1990s, 100 households in Bern (population under 200) were given a Maytag washing machine as part of an efficiency experiment.

# GLACIAL HILLS SCENIC BYWAY

If you need proof that Kansas isn't flat, travel the Glacial Hills Scenic Byway, named for the rolling topography, verdant valleys and fertile farmland

left behind by the glaciers receding hundreds of thousands of years ago.

Located in the northernmost corner of Kansas, the byway runs from north to south starting at White Cloud and ending at Leavenworth. Additional communities include Troy and Atchison.

### What is the Kansas Explorers Club?

## Kansas Explorers have assured BKRT success

The popular Kansas Sampler Festival had come to an end after 28 years in 2017. Would people embrace a new concept? Would anyone come to the first-time Big Kansas Road Trip in 2018? Nobody knew for sure.

But there was one group that knew what they had to do. They knew they needed to be the core audience and help show how to participate in this new event. That they did. It was more than a couple of hundred Kansas Explorers Club members from all over the state who turned out to show how to explore with joy and purpose.

In general, members have learned that buying stamps in small-town post offices help increase revenue. Revenue plus the number of post office boxes, number of bulk rate permits, and amount of mail are some of the determinants of salaries and open hours for a post office. When you find an open post office on the 2020 BKRT, please buy!

Explorers know that for a wholesale truck to even stop at a grocery store, the store must buy at least \$10,000 worth of groceries a week. Since many small stores can't do that, they sometime share orders with another store or buy their inventory from a big box store. It certainly isn't easy and owners work long hours. If you can, buy \$18.61 worth of groceries in small grocery stores during the BKRT.

Those who work in historic theaters, museums, golf courses, art galleries, and, well, just about any business or organization in these three counties could use a pat on the back or a friendly word and will enjoy conversations with you.

Whether you are an official Kansas Explorer Club member or not, your attendance is meaningful and your actions can help decide the success of the 2020 BKRT. Thank you all!


